Dear Principal and Governing Board members,

When a child is diagnosed with type 1 diabetes, they will immediately wonder: "How am I going to spend Halloween with my friends and eat my candies?".

It's the first and perhaps one of the most concrete experiences of grief they'll have as a child. Accepting the loss of being able to eat candy worry-free is it's own form of mourning.

Type 1 diabetes strikes without warning and has absolutely nothing to do with diet or lifestyle. To this day, it still cannot be cured.

From the moment of diagnosis, a child with type 1 diabetes will have to carefully calculate carbohydrate intake at every meal. There will NEVER be a break.

Today, **more than four thousand people** in Quebec live with the issues and challenges of type 1 diabetes, and that number is growing.

One of them may attend your school, and like all their friends, will go trick-or-treating on Halloween, but when they get home, their parents will have to make a choice and let them eat just one piece of candy to keep their blood sugar stable.


Raising awareness and educating


Workbook full of fun activities, suitable for all levels

Type I diabetes in children

Diabetes is a **chronic autoimmune** disease that occurs when the body can no longer produce insulin.

Without insulin, the body can no longer metabolize sugar and convert it into energy to keep organs functioning. Glucose levels in the blood are no longer controlled and the body goes through periods of high and low blood sugar. If left untreated, they cause organ damage and can be life threatening.

Type 1 diabetes is a serious but **invisible** disease. It affects about **one in 300 children** between the ages of 5 and 18 in Canada.

In Quebec, more than 4,000 young people have been diagnosed to date, and this number is increasing every year.


